Dr. Ginni Mansberg | Evening Plenary - Seasonal Respiratory Diseases

Ginni is a GP, TV presenter, podcaster, speaker, author and columnist. She has a General Practice in Sydney's Sans Souci, where she specialises in women's health.

The author of <u>Save Your Brain!</u>, along with 6 other books, Ginni is the "Sunrise GP" on Channel 7, the host of Australian TV shows, "Embarrassing Bodies Down Under" and "Medicine or Myth". She is a podcast host on "Help I have a teenager" on the Mamamia Network, "Things You Can't Talk About on TV", on Audible as well as "Drivetime Medical", an educational podcast for health care professionals. She has a supervisory role in the Discipline of General Practice at the University of Notre Dame Sydney Medical School.

Dr. Jessica Kaufman | Vaccine Hesitancy Session

Dr. Jessica Kaufman is a Senior Research Fellow in the Vaccine Uptake Group at the Murdoch Children's Research Institute. She is an expert in vaccine communication and the social and behavioural science of vaccination. Some of her current projects include evaluating the impacts of vaccine mandates in Australia, developing an Arabic-language online game to reduce vaccine misinformation, and training community leaders to be vaccine advocates in the Asia Pacific region. Jessica is an NHMRC Emerging Leader Fellow and an E. H. Flack Foundation Fellow. She is the Deputy Chair of the Collaboration on Social Science and Immunisation (COSSI).



Dee Verma | Managing RSV in Primary Healthcare Settings

Dee is a paediatric Immunisation Pharmacist who is currently working at a tertiary teaching hospital in Melbourne. She manages the hospital-wide monoclonal antibody therapy program for the prevention of Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) in high-risk infants. She graduated with a Bachelor of Pharmacy (Hons) from Monash University in 2019 and completed her Graduate Certificate in Pharmacy Practice in 2020. Dee is currently undertaking a Master of Public Health at Monash University. Her primary interest lies in ensuring that high-risk patient cohorts are protected against vaccine-preventable diseases. She has a passion for promoting vaccine awareness and understanding amongst fellow health professionals and works with other hospitals and professional organisations to promote a vaccine-literate health community.

Dr. Ali Drummond | Breakfast Plenary - Culturally Safe Approach to Immunisation Practice

Dr Ali Drummond is a Meriam and Erubam man of Zenadh Kes (Torres Strait) and Wuthathi man from far north Queensland. He was appointed as the CEO of the Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses and Midwives (CATSINaM) in April 2023. A highly experienced leader in the sector, Dr Drummond has more than two decades of professional experience in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health, clinical practice, policy, research, and teaching and learning.

During his career, Dr Drummond has focussed on strengthening the health workforce to ensure a culturally safe health system. He has contributed to an innovative approach to nursing education in his role with Queensland University of Technology (QUT's) School of Nursing, and as inaugural co-Director of Indigenous Health within QUT's Faculty of Health.

Dr Drummond holds a Bachelor of Nursing Science and a Master of International Public Health. His recently awarded PhD critically examines how Australian nursing academics collaborate with Indigenous peoples in developing, delivering, and evaluating nursing curricula concerning Indigenous peoples' health and wellbeing.

Dr Drummond is a Fellow of the Higher Education Academy, a member of CATSINaM and the Torres Strait Islander Nurses Indigenous Corporation, and Chairperson of the Lowitja Institute Research Committee.
